Keeping Our Community Safe

September 11, 2024 Post Release Community Supervision 6500 Block of Valley Hi Drive, Sacramento

The Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) Unit conducted a probation search at the residence of two individuals under supervision. The search led to the discovery of significant illegal items, including approximately 1,238 grams of counterfeit oxycodone pills suspected to contain Fentanyl, about 80 counterfeit Xanax pills also suspected to contain Fentanyl, over \$11,000 in cash, a digital scale, and multiple identification cards. During the search, officers also located approximately over 14 grams of methamphetamine on one of the individuals. Both individuals were arrested and subsequently booked into the Sacramento County Jail on multiple charges, including violations of probation.

Youth Detention Facility (YDF) News

Culinary Arts Program

The Culinary Arts program is an eight-week program which provides the opportunity for residents to participate in culinary exploration, learn a wide variety of culinary skills, and execute recipes using their new found skills. In the last month, residents made risotto for staff and classmates after learning about how to work with starches and grains. Residents were given feedback based on their stock to cheese ratio and the elasticity of their rice. The following week, residents used their knowledge of starches and grains to make pancakes. They also made house potatoes, eggs, and bacon to accompany their pancakes. During the final week of the month, residents participated in a homemade pizza lab. They were able to use their new skills to make pizzas from scratch. Residents learned the science of leavening pizza dough for their personal pizzas and prepared them in the new kitchen equipment. The residents agreed that making breakfast was a skill most likely to be used upon release. They all did an amazing job and welcome the opportunities that these skills may provide in the future.



Leadership Education and Athletic Program (LEAP)

LEAP staff did an introduction to football for residents in Housing Unit 5. Residents were taught the basic fundamentals of the sport including the various positions. After residents grasped the concept of their positions, multiple scrimmage games were played. In addition, residents also played dodgeball, pickle ball, soccer, and basketball.

LEAP staff also took the residents in the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program to the gym to either play basketball and exercise as well as HU 9 to play board games and paint.

Youth Detention Facility (YDF) News

Northern California Construction Training (NCCT)

During the month of September, NCCT residents transitioned from cutting, sanding, and painting inside the unit to moving their work outside in the courtyard. Residents worked on building and painting chairs to send home to their families. They also participated in the Labor Agility Test which is conducted quarterly and began working on their yearly holiday decorations.



Northern California Construction Training

Youth Community Outreach Unit (YCOU)

This month, the Youth Community Outreach Unit provided services to Sacramento Parks and Recreation and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). The youth, assisted in park property clean up, and fire risk reduction around the BLM visiting center and public walkways. Several YCOU youth were transported to the Department of Motor Vehicles where they started the application process for obtaining an identification card. When the Youth were unable to participate in outdoor projects, the Youth worked inside the Youth Detention Facility. They swept and mopped all the floors, cleaned the courtyard and shower areas in the units, and assisted with general cleaning in the facility.
