Positive Active Re-Entry Supervision

A youth who was committed to the Sacramento County Secure Youth Treatment Facility, Valley Oak Youth Academy (VOYA) in April 2023, has made significant accomplishments worthy of recognition. While participating in the VOYA program, he completed the less restrictive program of Pine Grove Youth Conservation Camp, obtaining all National Wildfire Coordinating Group certifications. He also obtained his Associates of Arts Degree in Social Sciences through Lake Tahoe Community College with a final GPA of 3.76. In April 2024, he was released to VOYA re-entry services and community supervision. He obtained employment as a firefighter with U.S. Forestry Fire Services and began working full-time immediately upon his return to his community. This youth has also successfully obtained his California Driver's License, opened his first bank account and saved his own money to purchase his first vehicle.

Veterans Treatment Court Graduates

On November 15, 2024, two clients graduated from the Sacramento County Veteran's Treatment Court. During the twelve month program, clients participate in classes and treatment that focus on mental health, reducing recidivism, improving public safety and drug/alcohol testing.



Adult Day Reporting Center (ADRC) Graduation

On November 21, 2024, the North Adult Day Reporting Center (ADRC) celebrated the graduation of nine clients. The ADRC program provides a wide range of services to clients which include a combination of cognitive behavioral treatment interventions, substance misuse treatment, self-help courses, educational programming, connections to housing, and vocational assistance. Clients also receive family support services, participate in pro-social activities, and pay victim restitution through the Community Outreach Program.


Probation Outreach Vehicle

Culinary Arts Program

During the week of November 4, 2024 - November 8, 2024, residents from housing unit 11 used new skills to make gumbo. To accompany their gumbo, residents made cornbread muffins and rice. Pictured below you can see the residents mixing their individual gumbo recipes, preparing ingredients, and measuring cornmeal for their cornbread muffins. All other units made French onion soup for the first time. During the week of November 18, 2024 – November 22, 2024, residents from housing unit 11 used new skills to make stuffed chicken breast and rice pilaf with collard greens. All other units made Risotto for the first time. These residents said the risotto tasted like mac n' cheese with rice and they would make it again.

Residents were provided with pamphlets and necessary voting information to review prior to completing their ballots.
